Designer to the Rescue: Dunagan Diverio Design Group

When a retired judge and his wife purchased a 4000-square-foot Miami Beach penthouse, they turned to Charlotte Dunagan and Thomas Diverio of <u>Dunagan Diverio Design Group</u> for a renovation that brings the stunning 270-degree views of the Atlantic and Biscayne Bay into every room.

Adds Dunagan: "The view from behind the cooktop is second to none, as you cook and look out over the Atlantic Ocean from 18 floors above."




